Summer Bridging Work is an important part of your transition to Wilberforce Sixth Form College. This piece of work will count towards your effort grade. Please complete your summer bridging work in time for the start of term.

You are required to bring evidence in paper format and hand this to your subject teacher, Lisa Davies, during your first lesson.

ENGLISH LITERATURE

OVERVIEW OF SUBJECT

On the English Literature course you will analyse texts and apply literary criticism to expand your insights into issues such as gender, race, class and the workings of the human mind. You will analyse how meaning is created within texts, using knowledge of language, form and structure along with the evaluation of the contextual factors. You will also have the opportunity for in the coursework element of the course.

You will study a range of classic/contemporary texts:

DRAMA: You will study Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, explored in the context of dramatic comedy. You will study Tennessee Williams' domestic tragedy *A Streetcar Named Desire*.

PROSE: A comparison of Khaled Hosseini's *A Thousand Splendid Suns* with Thomas Hardy's *Tess of the d'Urbervilles,* explored in the context of Women and Society.

POETRY: You will compare an unseen poem with a named poem from a collection of modern poems from *Poems Of The Decade: An Anthology Of The Forward Books Of Poetry* by The Poetry Foundation. You will also study a selection of Romantic poetry.

ENTRY CRITERIA

You will need a minimum of five GCSE grades 9-4 and a GCSE average of 5.3. You will also need to have achieved a grade 4 or higher in GCSE English Language or Literature.

LITERACY TASK – Analyse 'The Lammas Hireling'

Task 1: Research task

Listen to and/or read Ian Duhig reading his poem, 'The Lammas Hireling.' (This is one of your set post-2000 poems). Make notes on what inspired Ian Duhig to write the poem.
