### Uniformed Protective Services – Extended Certificate

#### OVERVIEW OF SUBJECT

This course is for you if you want a career in the public sector and uniformed service occupations, with a focus on jobs within the Criminal Justice System such as the police service, prison service, probation service, and the courts. It will give you the skills that are necessary for a career in Uniformed Protective Services, but also skills that are transferable and important to any career, such as communication and time management.

You could also progress onto university. This course is multi-disciplinary and therefore covers a large range of subjects, including; law, criminology, psychology, sociology, teamwork, leadership, government and many more. Studying a subject this diverse has the benefit that it can lead to many different courses at university, as well as a variety of careers both in the public and private sector.

#### ENTRY CRITERIA

**Uniformed Protective Services: Extended Certificate** - You must have a minimum of five GCSEs at grades 9-4, including English Language and Maths.
